



Geneva Open House Celebrates Teamwork and Cooperation



On Thursday, July 26th, 2007, Red Gold hosted an Open House at our Geneva Facility to celebrate our new seasonal worker housing. Two new buildings were simultaneously constructed to house 160 residents combined. Each building contains 23 apartments, with a full bath, kitchenette and air-conditioning.

Like the new units added at our Orestes facility, these have six-inch fully insulated walls, thermopane windows, residential brick exterior, Energy Star® appliances and electric glass top ranges. Additionally, each apartment is fully wired with free local television signals. Residents may subscribe to satellite service through the available dish as well.

Approximately 40 people attended the open house, including local residents, neighbors, and city and area agency representatives. Members of the general public were invited to attend through fliers posted at the Town of Geneva municipal building, Post Office and public library. Door prizes and Red Gold product samples were provided.

This was a complex project and required tremendous amount of teamwork. The buildings were financed by two grant sources in addition to Red Gold's contribution.

The partners in the projects were:

Building 122 - The Department of Housing and Urban Development, Indiana, Housing & Community Development Authority, Town of Geneva, Habitat for Humanity of Adams County, Milestone Ventures grant administrators, Prince/Alexander Architecture and Limberlost Construction of Geneva.

Other invited guests and attendees were from the Texas Migrant Council, state officials, local elected officials from the Town of Geneva and Adams County. Business leaders and suppliers for the construction projects attended as well.
